
2016 Survey of graduating seniors on their Stevenson Core Course experience





The core course helped solidify the Stevenson community for me. Even today I can run into any of my old classmates from freshman year and say hi.





This school is already reducing in its uniqueness and quality since I've been a student here. Reducing a fundamental part of the Stevenson education would be detrimental to our college community.


